# Benevolent Trust

I would like to congratulate you all on being part of the Benevolent Trust Mobile Dental Program and securing its future with the purchase of two new mobile dental labs. Both are in full operation and will be covering all

areas of the state throughout the year. Our dentist Dr. Beck and his staff offer us their utmost gratitude to have the most updated dental equipment, allowing them to give better care to our clients.



Recently I and 12 other Elks, with the assistance of Dr. Tinnel and Dr. Beck, attended *A Day On The Hill* at the state capital. The objective of this collaborative event was to talk to our state Senators and House Representatives on the workings of the Missouri Elks Association, our programs such as Drug Awareness, Youth, Veteran's, Blood Drive and our major state project, the Benevolent Trust and its mobile dental program. It was apparent from those who attended that we are worried the funding we've received from the state in the past could be reduced, or worse canceled in whole. With that said, the

group communicated to over 50 Senators and Representatives on how our dental program works and the financial benefits the state receives by not being burdened with all the red tape of the state's Medicaid system. I would have liked to address Governor Greiten but his schedule was pretty busy.

Governor Greiten withheld \$50,000 of the \$200,000 that was budgeted last year. We as Elks will have to address this financial shortfall to keep our program running as in the past. Information from our State Government Relations Chairman Jeremiah Cook and Lobbyist Mike Michaelson it appears the upcoming Governor's state budget does not contain a budget line item for our program with the Truman Medical Center. This would be a great financial hardship to us. I along with Jeremiah, Mike and PSP Jimmy Hahn are working on possible alternative plans to address this issue. At first I was fearful of what could happen but my mind has changed and I am now embracing this challenge and have rolled up my sleeves for the fight if necessary.

Showing his gratitude, Dr. Beck has donated a 41"x29" framed painting of an elk he purchased to help raise funds for the Benevolent Trust. Here's a brief history of this photo: The artist, Mr. Roger Simmons is a caregiver to brain trauma patients out of Springfield, MO. Mr. Simmons has brought some of his clients to the dental van for care. In conversation Dr.

Beck learned Mr. Simmons is an artist working in oil, acrylic and pencil and favors wildlife pictures. Dr. Beck asked if he would be interested in painting a picture of an Elk and Mr. Simmons graciously agreed as he respects the work the Elks are doing with the Dental Program. (Photo below)

With that, beginning at this year's Spring Convention the Benevolent Trust Board of Management District Repre-

sentatives and all Lodge Exalted Rulers will begin to sell raffle tickets for this painting, culminating at our fall convention in September where the winning ticket will be drawn.

To reach our \$4.50 per capita goal we will need a BIG PUSH at spring convention with pledges and donations accepted thru the end of this fiscal year (March 31). You can send your pledges direct to Dennis Harrington at 246 Pamela Avenue, Belton, MO 64012.


